ANTIBULLYING POLICY

This policy is created for all pupils attending Impact on either site. Both Oakfield and Dale Acre.

Introduction

This policy is based on DfE guidance 'Preventing and Tackling Bullying' July 2017 and supporting documents. It also considers the DfE statutory guidance "Keeping Children Safe in Education" 2022. The school has read Childnet's "Cyberbullying: Understand, Prevent and Respond: Guidance for Schools".

Objectivise

This policy outlines what Impact PRU will do to prevent and tackle bullying. The policy has been drawn up through the involvement of the whole PRU community and we are committed to developing an anti-bullying culture whereby no bullying, including between adults or adults and children and young people will be tolerated.

Legislation

There are a number of pieces of legislation which set out measures and actions for schools in response to bullying, as well as criminal and civil law. These may include (but are not limited to):

- The Education and Inspection Act 2006, 2011
- The Equality Act 2010
- The Children Act 1989
- Protection from Harassment Act 1997
- The Malicious Communications Act 1988
- Public Order Act 1986

Definition of Bullying

Bullying is defined as:

'Behaviour by an individual or a group, repeated over time that intentionally hurts another individual either physically or emotionally.'

(DfE "Preventing and Tackling Bullying", July 2017)

Bullying can include: name calling, taunting, mocking, making offensive comments; kicking; hitting; taking belongings; producing offensive graffiti; gossiping; excluding people from groups and spreading hurtful and untruthful rumours. This includes the same unacceptable behaviours expressed online, sometimes called online or cyberbullying. This can include: sending offensive, upsetting and inappropriate messages by phone, text, instant messenger, through gaming, websites, social media sites and apps, and sending offensive or degrading photos or videos. Bullying can be a form of child on child abuse and can be emotionally abusive; it can cause severe and adverse effects on children's emotional development.

Forms of bullying

The Impact PRU community recognises that bullying, especially if left unaddressed, can have a devastating effect on individuals; it can create a barrier to learning and have serious consequences for mental wellbeing. By effectively preventing and tackling bullying, our Unit can help to create a safe environment, where pupils are able to learn and fulfil their potential.

Our Unit:

- Monitors and reviews our anti-bullying policy and practice on a regular basis.
- Supports staff to promote positive relationships to prevent bullying.
- Recognises that some members of our community may be more vulnerable to bullying and its impact than
 others; being aware of this will help us to develop effective strategies to prevent bullying from happening
 and provide appropriate support, if required.
- Will intervene by identifying and tackling bullying behaviour appropriately and promptly.

- Ensures our pupils are aware that bullying concerns will be dealt with sensitively and effectively; that everyone should feel safe to learn and abide by the anti-bullying policy.
- Requires all members of the community to work with The Impact to uphold the anti-bullying policy.
- Reports back to parents/carers regarding concerns on bullying, dealing promptly with complaints.
- Seeks to learn from good anti-bullying practice elsewhere
- Utilises support from the Local Authority and other relevant organisations when appropriate

Responding to Bullying

The following steps may be taken when dealing with all incidents of bullying reported to our Unit:

- If bullying is suspected or reported, the incident will be dealt with immediately by the member of staff who has been approached or witnessed the concern.
- Impact staff will provide appropriate support for the person being bullied making sure they are not at risk of immediate harm and will involve them in any decision-making, as appropriate.
- The headteacher/designated safeguarding lead or another member of the senior leadership team will interview all parties involved.
- The designated safeguarding lead will be informed of all bullying issues where there are safeguarding concerns.
- Impact will inform other staff members, and parents/carers, where appropriate.
- Sanctions (as identified within the school behaviour policy) and support for individuals will be implemented, in consultation with all parties concerned.
- If necessary, other agencies may be consulted or involved, such as: the police (if a criminal offence has been committed) or other local services including early help or children's social care (if a child is felt to be at risk of significant harm).
- Where the bullying takes place off our site or outside of normal school hours (including cyberbullying),
 Impact will ensure that the concern is fully investigated. Appropriate action will be taken, including providing support.
- A clear and precise account of the incident will be recorded by the staff in accordance with existing procedures. This will include recording appropriate details regarding decisions and action taken.

Cyberbullying

Childnet Cyberbullying guidance is accessible for all staff.

When responding to cyberbullying concerns, our Unit will:

- Act as soon as an incident has been reported or identified.
- Provide appropriate support for the person who has been cyberbullied and work with the person who has carried out the bullying to ensure that it does not happen again.
- Encourage the person being bullied to keep any evidence (screenshots) of the bullying activity to assist any investigation.
- Take all available steps where possible to identify the person responsible. This may include: o
 Looking at use of the school systems; o Identifying and interviewing possible witnesses; o Contacting
 the service provider and the police, if necessary.
- Work with the individuals and online service providers to prevent the incident from spreading and
 assist in removing offensive or upsetting material from circulation. This may include: o Support
 reports to a service provider to remove content if those involved are unable to be identified or if those
 involved refuse to or are unable to delete content.
 - O Confiscating and searching pupils' electronic devices, such as mobile phones, in accordance with the law and also the Unit's searching and confiscation policy.

- Requesting the deletion of locally-held content and content posted online if they contravene Unit behavioural policies.
- Ensure that sanctions are applied to the person responsible for the cyberbullying; Impact will take steps to change the attitude and behaviour of the bully, as well as ensuring access to any additional help that they may need.
- Inform the police if a criminal offence has been committed.
- Provide information to staff and pupils regarding steps they can take to protect themselves online. This may include:
- Advising those targeted not to retaliate or reply;
- Providing advice on blocking or removing people from contact lists;
- Helping those involved to think carefully about what private information they may have in the public domain.

Supporting Pupils

Pupils who have been bullied will be supported by:

- Reassuring the pupil and providing continuous support.
- Offering an immediate opportunity to discuss the experience with their teacher, the designated safeguarding lead or a member of staff of their choice.
- Being advised to keep a record of the bullying as evidence and discuss how to respond to concerns and build resilience as appropriate.
- Working towards restoring self-esteem and confidence.
- Providing ongoing support, this may include: working and speaking with staff, offering more specialised intervention, engaging with parents/carers.
- Where necessary, working with the wider community and local/national organisations to provide further or specialist advice and guidance.

Pupils who have perpetrated the bullying will be helped by:

- Discussing what happened, establishing the concern and the need to change.
- Informing parents/carers to help change the attitude and behaviour of the child.
- Providing appropriate education and support regarding their behaviour or actions.
- If online, requesting that content be removed and reporting accounts/content to the SLT.
- Where necessary, working with the wider community and local/national organisations to provide further
 or specialist advice and guidance; this may include involvement from the Police or referrals to other
 support services as appropriate.
- Pupils will be given support by the school counsellors

Supporting Adults

Impact takes measures to prevent and tackle bullying among pupils; however, it is equally important to recognise that bullying of staff and parents, whether by pupils, parents or other staff members is unacceptable.

Adults (staff and parents) who have been bullied or affected will be supported by:

- Offering an immediate opportunity to discuss the concern with the designated safeguarding lead, a senior member of staff/headteacher.
- Advising them to keep a record of the bullying as evidence and discuss how respond to concerns and build resilience as appropriate.

- Where the bullying takes place off the PRU site or outside of the normal Unit hours (including online) the PRU will seek further guidance as to the appropriate procedures and ensure that appropriate action
- Reassuring and offering appropriate support.
- Working with the wider community and local/national organisations to provide further or specialist advice and guidance.

Adults (staff and parents) who have perpetrated the bullying will be helped by:

- Discussing what happened with a senior member of staff and/or headteacher to establish the concern.
- Establishing whether a legitimate grievance or concern has been raised and signposting to the Unit's official complaints procedures.
- If online, requesting content be removed.
- Instigating disciplinary, civil or legal action as appropriate or required.
- Staff will be offered the support of school counsellors and offer a referral to Occupational Health for further support if required.

Preventing Bullying Environment

The PRU community will:

- Create and support an inclusive environment which promotes a culture of mutual respect, consideration and care for others which will be upheld by all.
- Recognise that bullying can be perpetrated or experienced by any member of the community, including adults and children (child on child abuse).
- Openly discuss differences between people that could motivate bullying, such as: religion, ethnicity, disability, gender, sexuality or appearance related difference. Also children with different family situations, such as looked after children or those with caring responsibilities.
- Challenge practice and language which does not uphold the values of tolerance, non-discrimination and respect towards others.
- Be encouraged to use technology, especially mobile phones and social media positively and responsibly.
- Work with staff, the wider community and outside agencies to prevent and tackle concerns including all forms of prejudice-driven bullying.
- Actively create 'safe spaces' for vulnerable children and young people.
- Celebrate success and achievements to promote and build a positive Unit ethos.

Policy and Support

The PRU community will:

- Provide a range of approaches for pupils, staff and parents/carers to access support and report concerns.
- Regularly update and evaluate our practice to take into account the developments of technology and provide up-to-date advice and education to all members of the community regarding positive online behaviour.
- Take appropriate, proportionate and reasonable action, in line with existing policies, for any bullying brought that is brought to attention, which involves or effects pupils, even when they are not on premises; for example, when using transport or online etc.

Education and Training

The PRU community will:

- Train all staff including teaching staff, support staff (including administration staff) to identify all forms
 of bullying and take appropriate action, following the policy and procedures (including recording and
 reporting incidents).
- Consider a range of opportunities and approaches for addressing bullying throughout the curriculum and other activities, such as: through displays, peer support and pupil voice.
- Provide systematic opportunities to develop pupils' social and emotional skills, including building their resilience and self-esteem.

Involvement of Pupils

We will:

- Involve pupils in policy writing and decision making, to ensure that they understand the Unit's approach and are clear about the part they have to play to prevent bullying.
- Regularly canvas children and young people's views on the extent and nature of bullying.
- Ensure that all pupils know how to express worries and anxieties about bullying.
- Ensure that all pupils are aware of the range of sanctions which may be applied against those engaging in bullying.
- Involve pupils in anti-bullying campaigns in schools and embedded messages in the wider curriculum.
- Publicise the details of internal support, as well as external helplines and websites.
- Offer support to pupils who have been bullied and to those who are bullying in order to address the problems they have.

Parents and Carers

We will:

- Take steps to involve parents and carers in developing policies and procedures, to ensure they are aware that the does not tolerate any form of bullying.
- Make sure that the key information about bullying (including policies and named points of contact) is available to parents/carers in a variety of formats.
- Ensure that all parents/carers know who to contact if they are worried about bullying and where to access independent advice.
- Work with all parents/carers and the local community to address issues beyond the PRU that give rise to bullying.
- Ensure that parents work with the Impact to role model positive behaviour for pupils, both on and offline.
- Ensure all parents/carers know about our complaints procedure and how to use it effectively, to raise concerns in an appropriate manner.

Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of:

- The Headteacher to communicate the policy to the Impact community and to ensure that disciplinary
 measures are applied fairly, consistently and reasonably, and that member of the senior leadership team
 has been identified to take overall responsibility
- PRU Governors to take a lead role in monitoring and reviewing this policy.
- All staff including: governors, senior leadership, teaching and non-teaching staff to support, uphold and implement this policy accordingly.
- Parents/carers to support their children and work in partnership with Pupils to abide by the policy.

Recording system for the monitoring of bullying

Use of CPOMS to record, track and monitor bullying incidents. Completed incident forms to be kept in pupil's reference file.

Monitoring and review

The Impact will ensure that we regularly monitor and evaluate mechanisms to ensure that the policy is being consistently applied. The headteacher will be informed of bullying concerns, as appropriate. The named Governor for bullying will report on a regular basis to the governing body on incidents of bullying, including outcomes.

Complaints

If you are unhappy with the way an incident of bullying has been handled, complaints should be made in accordance with the school's Complaints Policy, which is available on the school website or from the school office.
